**1. Confirmation of Minutes of the Ordinary Meeting dated 6<sup>th</sup> March 2018.**

Councillor Matthews proposed confirmation of the minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Municipal District of Bray dated 6<sup>th</sup> March 2018 and Councillor Behan seconded the proposal.

**2. To a Presentation on Community Grants**

The members received the following presentation from Theresa O'Brien and Deirdre Whitfield, Wicklow County Council.

This is a suite or package of supports that recognizes the need for new ways of engaging people and empowering community and voluntary groups to ensure the sustainability of towns and villages. It recognizes that in small towns and villages, community development is not just social development. It is also economic development. This recognizes the need for a more holistic approach where social, community, economic and business are part of the same development process.

The Information given on the funding schemes are based on the schemes in 2016 and 2017. 2018 schemes have yet to be announced. The schemes are run by the Department of Rural and Community Development. Please note: **There may be changes to the amount of schemes, the criteria, times etc. Decisions on funding allocation are made by the Department, not Wicklow County Council.**

Factors have been identified that lead to success for turnaround towns and villages. These are:

A coherent approach that maximizes the use of a comprehensive package of tools and supports rather than a piecemeal approach. Define your area and what it can offer. Have a story – clarity of history and purpose allows residents to articulate their areas raison d'être creating a shared positive narrative. You can see a lot by observing. The best way to turn an area around is to take a close look at what works and what doesn't. Take into account how people use a place and all the different uses that are involved. A great place offers many uses and they add up to more than the sum of its parts.

Successful area improvement relies on engaged local citizens. Develop a vision, created by the people that live there and translate that into a plan, a living flexible plan. Include as many as possible. Don't be afraid to experiment or to modify or reset goals according to changing circumstances or opportunities.

Take an asset based approach identifying physical, environmental and human/people assets. Define assets and opportunities, including the skills that people can offer. This will lead to innovative strategies that capitalize on a

community's competitive advantage. Take a pro-active and future oriented approach and define and address challenges.

Identify the social and economic linkages between a town and its hinterland and specify means of improving these. Related to this is to explore opportunities for towns/villages to cluster together and work together to maximize opportunities, using complementary uses and offerings to meet the needs of residents, communities, visitors, businesses and entrepreneurs. This is especially important for the more vulnerable areas i.e. those less positioned to take advantage of development opportunities. This approach is called networked local development. Don't underestimate the social and economic benefits of the public realm. Making a place more attractive to be in builds community pride, motivates a community and means that people are more likely to spend time and money there.

Build partnerships, both locally within the community and externally with relevant organisations and institutions. There is a need for new alliances and approaches. This is about taking a holistic approach. The right partners will bring more resources, innovative ideas and new sources of energy.

Little things can set the stage for big change – if only to prove to people that change is possible. If there is a motivated community they will have the creativity and the energy to overcome obstacles

The bad news is you are never finished! 80% of the success of any good place is due to how well it is managed after the job is done

Start now and be prepared. Timelines with these schemes are tight. Therefore:

- Be prepared – Start now
- Have a plan/projects
- Commitment will be required
- Get community buy-in
- Get buy-in from relevant agencies e.g. Municipal Districts
- Match-funding?
- Leases?
- Planning and procurement requirements?
- Seasonal factors for outdoor work?

## LEADER

The LEADER Programme in Wicklow has been supporting communities and businesses for the past 25 years. To date Wicklow has benefited from almost €16 million in LEADER funds amounting to some 632 community and business projects being supported throughout the county. The new LEADER 2015-2020 Programme is underway since 2016 with a budget in excess of €6 million being approved for County Wicklow. The members raised the following points;

- Three years ago an application was made in relation to the Town Clock which was refused. Landscaping works, Wayfinding Signs, we would be better advised to submit this again as part of a whole range of projects, not a stand alone project.
- Residents Associations, what funding should they apply for?
- RAPID, do all estates throughout Wicklow County Council qualify?
- The application process is difficult for example LEADER, some are put off by the system. It is EU money/funded.
- This has to be community driven from the ground up, how do we engage with the different groups?
- We did not have many projects last year.
- How many applications were received from Bray Municipal District last year, do you have an overall figure? There seems to be a disconnection from the District, how do we improve the system?

Resident Associations should apply for Community Grants it is too late to do so this year. The Community Facilities fund has not been announced yet. Only some estates qualify for RAPID. We get groups through

workshops. Bray Municipal District had a bigger amount of applications than last year but still the lowest number of applications than other Districts. The District Administrators are on the committee judging the applications, We notify members, advertise, put the information on the website, send out information through the PPN, I don't know what the solution is to getting the information out to the public. We will assist groups as much as possible

Councillor Behan stated that the Bray Local Drugs Task Force coordinator has not been replaced and there has been no meeting in the HSE building since Christmas can we discuss this later.

## The Challenges

1. **Lack of protection from E/NE Gales:**
  - Harbour unsafe for moored boats – many are leaving
  - No No for visiting boats
  - No No for commercial leisure activity
  - No No for developing tourism – visiting coastal cruises
2. **Lack of access to deep water:**
  - No No for visiting deep draft boats/ Restricted access
  - No No for commercial leisure activity development
  - No No for developing tourism – EG visiting coastal cruises
  - Reduced Rescue capability
3. **Build up of sand deposit in harbour:**
  - Reduced usability of moorings
  - Significantly reduced usability & safety of slipways.
4. **Lack of onshore facilities:**
  - Reduced ability to attract quality commercial leisure activities

## What is needed

1. **A protected harbour that retains its character**
2. **A deep water channel in the river at north wall that provides pontoons /berths for easy access to the water at all times for all harbour users**
  - Commercial marine related leisure activity
  - Deep water berths for say 10 visiting deep draft boats
3. **A berth for a coastal cruise passenger boat of up to 200 passengers**
4. **Drying out moorings navigable 3hrs either side of HW**
  - 140 for letting to harbour users
  - 5 for visiting boats
  - Pontoon for up to 5 short stay visitors

## Benefits

- A high quality amenity for all :Local/Visitor Water user/Others
- Harbour integrates with promenade and river

## Marine Recreation & Process of Rejuvenation of Small Ports & Harbours (Brady Shipman Martin, 2011)

### Key Findings:

#### **The market for Marine Leisure activities:**

- In general, market demand for marine recreation has been increasing.
- The domestic market for water-based tourism and leisure is worth about €380m per annum
- Overseas visitors engaging in water-based tourism and leisure activities spend a further €110m each year

#### **Factors to consider in assessing the likely demand for marine recreation include:**

- Population levels and trends in an area
- Trends in income levels, in particular disposable incomes
- People's propensity to engage in marine recreational activities, and the types of activities they engage in
- The likely size of the overnight visitor market for marine recreational activities

### Summary

- Existing harbour walls are a huge asset that can be leveraged to provide excellent facilities at relatively low cost.
- It will give easy/inexpensive access to marine leisure activities to everyone through pay for play operators and unrestricted use pontoons.
- Creates a living harbour environment that retains the character of existing harbour
- Improves Bray's attractiveness to prospective employers/employees
- Greatly enhances Bray's emergency/rescue capability
- Important piece of tourism infrastructure that can yield immediate benefits and links to other harbours & locations in Wicklow.
- Stand Alone project that will complement any future development around harbour commercial/residential. It will put the Council in a strong position to seek significant development contributions from developers

The members raised the following points;

- Thank you for your presentation you are pushing an open door. What was missing in the past was a plan and clear agreement of all the users but you have brought this together. I am surprised at the cost of the harbour wall. Is it feasible to build out further, have you looked into this or did you feel this was too ambitious. The idea of having the piers lit is welcome and also the replica of the previous lighthouse.
- This is the culmination of the committee who have working together for a year; it is a detailed presentation. There was a Mooring Committee in place years ago but this drifted away. This is the first time a realistic plan has been brought before the Council; this is a plan that can happen quickly. It will be a fantastic asset to the town. We have not put any money in this area for a long time, it is a wonderful opportunity.
- This presentation is professional and well thought out; it is a win win situation in one of the best located towns in Ireland. Water sports have come to the fore and are an asset to the health of the youth. It will enhance the ambience of the area; this is the future of Bray.
- This is a fabulous plan and cheap at the price with the benefits it will bring.
- I am in agreement that this is the plan to proceed and want to see something positive happen with the harbour. We as Councillors can also help you to apply for funding.
- One of your strengths is that you got everyone on board. It is important that the ethos remains with this project and includes young people across the entire town. The Harbours Users Committee was not followed up over the years. I support in principle your presentation but there are other projects being allocated money here tonight.

The District Manager asked if there was any costing of the deep water channel maintenance.

JJ O'Dwyer and Tony Foran responded that the brief is ambitious what we are looking at is the first steps and any development can only take place if protection is in place. This is a wonderful opportunity for the people of Bray not an elite group.

There is a series of sluice pipes which are self draining and self cleaning.

#### **4. To Receive the Housing Report**

The following report was circulated to the members.

##### **Oldcourt Energy Efficiency Works**

Works to the 9 dwellings in Tranche No.4 commenced on the 8<sup>th</sup> January 2018 were completed on schedule. Works to the next tranche of dwellings has commenced.

##### **Kilbride Lane**

Tenders in relation to Kilbride Lane/Murphy's lands were assessed during December 2017. The lowest tenderer withdrew from the competition after they stated that they could not stand over their tendered price following a clarification request. The Council's appointed consultants have concluded their discussions with the second lowest tenderer, MDY Construction Limited, with a letter of intent having been issued on the 27th March. Subject to no objections being received within the 14 day standstill period it is envisaged that contracts will be signed during the week commencing Monday 16<sup>th</sup> April 2018.

##### **87 O'Byrne Road**

Works for the construction of a 3 bed roomed detached dwelling on the lands adjacent to No.87 O'Byrne Road commenced in November 2017, the scheduled completion date of the project is the second half of August 2018. Works are proceeding on schedule with the floor slab complete & construction of the rising walls having commenced.

The members raised the following points;

- Tenants are being charged for boiler maintenance service and not every boiler was serviced last year but people are being charged every week. A new contractor has now been appointed by Wicklow County Council; bit by bit we are losing our housing function.

Stephen Fox, Executive Engineer that there was difficulty with the performance of the contractor not all were serviced and the framework expired last year. A new tender was carried out by Wicklow County Council and a task order will issue to the successful tender in the coming week. Fassaroe will be targeted first and this will be progressed in the coming months. It is difficult to get a precise schedule of works as tenants are not always able to keep appointments. If you have any details of specific cases please forward them to myself and we can get the contractor to prioritise them. The €2 supplement is value for money it provides maintenance services and an afterhours services.

The Cathaoirleach Councillor Fox reminded the members that the housing needs assessment was being carried out at the moment, 800 were removed from the list the last time this was carried out.

#### 5. To receive a Report on Roads and Traffic.

The members raised the following points;

- I received a complaint from a member of the public who has limited sight that the audio is not working at Aldi, Vevay Road and Putland Road. One person had a very near miss recently and when they contacted the Council they got no response.
- There is a pothole at the Wilton which is dangerous.

The District Manger stated that the pothole was repaired today.

#### 6. To Agree a Programme of Expenditure on Capital Works (Previously Circulated)

The Cathaoirleach stated that we would begin with the original document as previously circulated to the members.

The members raised the following points;

- There are other ways of doing this; this money was paid because a shopping centre development was not provided on the Southern Cross. From the Vevay across to Ballywaltrim a substantial amount of this money should be spent in this area because they were denied this facility. Not just scrapes at the end of the night.
- When this item was discussed at the meeting in Wicklow the members wanted to distribute the money all over the county. I did not get the full support of all the members around this table. In 1994 €50,000 was paid for the lease of the Carlisle Grounds this money went to the Ballywaltrim

Playing Fields and was matched by the Government. There was no parochialism shown at that time and every person in the District is entitled.

- We had to fight hard for the money to come to Bray.
- Where did the criteria come from, how many Councillors sent in proposals?
- There is no rhyme or reason why Councillor Projects should be dealt with first as they were sent in, this money should be spent for the people of Bray.
- Everything needs to be looked at and we need to knock out some, omit what is not a priority.
- I am completely opposed and we should have no decision until we get through all the proposals.
- Are you trying to rush this through?
- Putting this back another month will not improve the situation.
- We have waited long enough
- The Capital Levies have been sitting in the bank since Bray Town Council was abolished.

The Cathaoirleach stated that he was seeking agreement tonight. If we exceed the total at the end then we can readjust.

At this point Councillor Ryan proposed a time extension to deal with this item and it was seconded by Councillor Vance.

Bray Harbour Improvements Proposed Amount €180,000

Councillor Vance proposed that the amount of €180,000 be raised to €200,000 and this was seconded by Councillor Matthews.

Councillor Behan asked is Councillor Vance proposing €600,000 for a feasibility study? Looking to ram this through tonight is unrealistic.

Councillor Vance responded that the allocation was not just for the feasibility study but for other works as well, the harbour is a desirable project.

Councillor Behan wished to place on record that he is not in favour of this proposal.

Blue Flag Proposed Amount €30,000

The members raised the following points;

- We won the Blue Flag after 20 years and we are doing our best to maintain it.
- What about a shelter for the swimmers?
- This could be included in the project and could also be included in the harbour project.
- This would mean a total of €350,000 for the seafront, €950,000 including development levies.
- The Blue Flag is desirable; a type of facility for swimmers was indicated in the Harbour Plan.

Councillors Behan and O'Connor wish to record that they were against this proposal.

Councillor Matthews proposed that €30,000 be allocated to the Blue Flag and Councillor Vance seconded the proposal.
